Writer in the Schools at AMCS

My name is Madeleine Gaudin and, over the past few weeks, I've had the pleasure of working with the Alief Montessori after school writing club. Together we've written odes, ekphrastic stories, and made anaphora poems using silly, mad-lib metaphors. It's been such a pleasure to see the Alief Montessori community in action and get to work with these funny and talented young writers.

The writing club is a partnership between AMCS and Writers in the Schools, an organization that partners with schools and community organizations across the city to provide creative writing programming for students in grades K-12. WITS has been working in the Houston community for over thirty years. In addition to working with students in schools, WITS also runs the Space City Slam Series, Meta-Four Houston, the Houston Youth Poet Laureate Program, Free Verse Open Mic Series, and countless other community programs. The Space City Slam Series, which kicks off on February 10, is a free youth poetry competition that invites performers ages 13-19 to compete for a spot on the renowned Meta-Four Houston youth poetry slam team. Free Verse is a monthly youth poetry open mic for writers aged 13-19. WITS also runs summer camps across the Houston area for students in grades K-12.

In addition to teaching with WITS, I also work for the organization as a Program Associate on a fellowship from the University of Houston. I'm currently working on a Masters of Fine Arts at UH, studying creative writing with a focus on fiction. I love writing short stories that incorporate elements of magical realism, and I'm currently working on a novel. Before coming to Houston, I was a teacher in Detroit Public Schools Community District, where I taught 5th and 2nd grade. Teaching and writing are my two favorite things to do, and so I'm so glad I have the opportunity to do both with the students at AMCS! Black History Month: A time to A.C.T. Jennifer Marshall (AMCS Parent)

February is Black History Month, a federally recognized annual celebration of the rich cultural heritage of African Americans, and a time to recognize the many contributions and sacrifices they made that helped shape the United States. This celebration originated in 1926 by historian and educator Carter G. Woodson, the first person born to enslaved parents to graduate from Harvard University. While Black History Month began as a week-long celebration, it was expanded to the full month of February in 1976 by President Gerald Ford. Woodson chose February to honor the birthdays of prolific writer, orator, and abolitionist Frederick Douglas (whose exact birthday is unknown), and President Abraham Lincoln, who signed the Emancipation Proclamation that abolished slavery in the confederate states.

Black History Month is a time to celebrate art, culture, and innovation, while respectfully honoring those who endured unthinkable hardship imposed through slavery, Jim Crow, systematic oppression, and racism. Though it is important to engage critically about these topics, it is just as important to remember Black history doesn't begin with slavery or end with the Civil Rights Movement. While slavery and the Civil Rights Movement may be the most recognizable subjects to begin and end Black History Month, Carter Woodson advocated to connect students with the history of significant African civilizations and their many accomplishments to world history.

Honoring and celebrating Black History Month is for everyone, no matter their race. Black History is American History. I encourage you to make a commitment to A.C.T (/ak(t)/ verb. take action; do something) in honor of Black History Month.

A.C.T: Acknowledge, Celebrate, and Transcend

Acknowledge: Acknowledge Atrocities and Adversity

The African-American community has endured many hardships, and the trauma of fighting for their basic rights is not to be taken lightly. Understanding the long-term ramifications of historical adversity, which includes slavery, sharecropping and race-based exclusion from health, educational, social and economic resources, translates into socioeconomic disparities experienced by African Americans today. Analyzing the accounts and experiences of the enslaved or civil right leaders brings a human dimension to the study of the Black History. These personal accounts allow us to see events from the victims' point of view and understand how they resisted spiritually and physically. Studying the atrocities allows us to understand the impact of history on our society and human beings. Acknowledging the past ensures that history is not repeated. Acknowledging the adversities of the African American plight will foster healing from historical trauma for future generations.

Celebrate: Celebrate the Contributions, Character, and Culture

Black History Month should be a celebration of achievements by African Americans and a time for recognizing their central role in U.S. history. As we reflect throughout Black History Month, we should:

- celebrate the Black American pioneers who've built a society from the ground up since 1619, when the first enslaved people were brought to America;
- honor the incredible contributions the Black community has made throughout U.S. history from civil rights leaders to artists, politicians to inventors;
- celebrate the Black history that's being made today and every day;
- highlight achievements and contributions, including pre-colonial history and profiles of contemporary figures from politics, education, pop culture, sports, or other areas;
- remember the resilience, mental fortitude, and moral qualities of those who loved this country when it was not the most welcoming.

Transcend: Transcend, Transform, and Teach others

Black History Month is a time to transcend cultural boundaries and embrace our differences. As we humbly evaluate and triumph over the negative or restrictive aspects of our own world views, personal basis, privilege, and internalized racism, we will transform into individuals who express our divine natures and in turn flood this world with kindness, respect, adoration, and goodwill towards our fellow man. As you transform, be sure to teach others by promoting cultural awareness, equality, and ongoing social change for all humanity. As we stand for all!

There are plenty of ways that everyone can A.C.T., commemorate Black History Month, and celebrate Black heroes even from the comfort of your own home. From supporting Black-owned businesses to donating to charities supporting anti-racism efforts and watching educational documentaries, here are 10 ways you can celebrate Black history — not just this month, but all year round.

Nestled in the heart of Houston's historically African American neighborhood, Third Ward, Emancipation Park's roots and land date back to 1872 — when a group of former slaves united to raise \$1,000 for the purchase of the 10-acre parcel to be used to host Juneteenth celebrations. After years of preservation and revitalization efforts — a feat that culminated with the park's current design by internationally lauded African American architect Phil Freelon, who made headlines for his work on the Smithsonian's National Museum of African American History and Culture in Washington D.C. — Emancipation Park has become a premier greenspace rooted in history. Take advantage of everything from EP's cultural and recreation centers to its various green areas and walking trails.

Let's talk about Reverend John Henry "Jack" Yates, an emancipated slave whose impact can be seen across Houston. A pillar of the African American community, Yates' Greek Revival home was originally erected in Freedmen's Town a mere five years after Emancipation. This exact house which was originally stationed at 1318 Andrews Street — now sits at Sam Houston Park on full display for visitors to experience. Its historic interiors have been furnished to depict the family's lifestyle in the late 19th century, and it even showcases some of the furniture that was in the house when the Yates family still lived there.
